2. A Half-Century of Behavior Services in Texas

This presentation covers the evolution of behavior services in Texas from the 1960s to the present. The earliest approaches were in institutional programs. Initially, the focus was on young residents, teaching self-help skills using edible reinforcers. Later the focus shifted to adults exhibiting challenging behaviors. Use of restrictive techniques increased, including a few aversive programs for severe self-injury. Criticism of the approaches increased in the 1980s, and an increased emphasis on positive reinforcement developed. However, as services shifted to community locations, availability of professional expertise and the continuing need for trained direct support staff have sometimes hindered program effectiveness.

1. Telepractice to Train Autism Teachers to Contrive MOs

The need for on-the-job coaching has been repeatedly documented in the literature as more effective than workshops. However, individualized coaching is time and labor intensive for the coach with many supervisees across broad geographical areas. Telepractice has been found to be effective for teaching evidence-based practices (EBPs) to teachers of students with autism. Using a multiple baseline across participants design, four teachers were taught to contrive motivating operations (MOs) through an online module, video models, and direct performance feedback via video-conferencing. Results indicated the effectiveness of telepractice in training teachers to contrive MOs to increase manding to students with autism.
